Haz-Mat and HM Ops MSC

Clarification of the path for Haz-Mat and HM Ops MSC certification and qualification. FIP-3052 will be replaced by FIP-6413. FIP-6411 & 6412 will be re-toggled to keep in line with the new standards. (See

attached packet #6)

New Business

Fire Instructor Requirements – Kevin Gordon

The Rules Committee recommends that students shall meet all requirements before taking the Instructor I certification course. Motion that all requirements must be met prior to taking the Instructor I course was made by Terry Foxx. Jim Hanline seconded. Motion approved. (See attached packet #1)

RIC and Breathing Equipment School - Kevin Gordon

Any instructor who takes Breathing Equipment School from July 1, 2016 forward, can take the test for RIC qualification at QSchool. Student must score at least 80% to pass. Passing the exam will give the student RIC certification and qualification. Ken Hogue made the motion to approve to allow testing at Qschool for students who have completed Breathing Equipment School July 1, 2016 or after. Students must pass with an 80% or better. This will allow them to gain RIC certification and RIC Instructor Qualification. The QSchool candidate must be an instructor. Jim Hanline seconded. Motion approved. (See attached packet #2)

Bridge Course - prior NFPA cycles - Kevin Gordon

Develop a bridge course for qualified instructors that will provide information that has been added to the standard. It would update certification levels from one standard to the next.

Joel Faircloth made a motion to develop a bridge course for Instructors. Terry Foxx seconded. Motion approved.

Fire Officer/ISO Equivalency – Kevin Gordon

Rules Committee recommends creating a Volunteer Fire Officer ISO 580C Certificate (non-Certification). This would allow departments to receive credit for individuals who have taken the Fire Officer Level 1 course, but do not meet the perquisites for certification. The student would receive a certificate of training and it would be listed on their OSFM Training transcript.

Walter Gardner motioned to approve. Wes Hutchins seconded. Motion approved. (see attached)

Live Fire Instructor and Live Fire Instructor in Charge – Kevin Gordon

Chapters 7 & 8 of NFPA 1041 Live Fire would be structured as a certification and a qualification in one five phase process.

Live Fire Instructor Certification and Live Fire Instructor in Charge (Chapter 8) and would go live on July 1, 2020.

- 1) Fire Instructor requirements (this will touch other certification areas as well); see the attached email string
- 2) RIC and Breathing Equipment School; Back to July 01, 2016 -

Attached you will find all the documents surrounding RIC from 2016/2017. I have no idea why that statement is in the minutes as nothing if the documents mention any of that topic. Regardless, it's a moot point.

We'll resolve this at the March CB meeting. I see no reason why breathing equipment school wouldn't be acceptable as a requisite requirement for an instructor to attempt qualification as a RIC instructor. I will add one part since we've all discussed this

today. I also see no issue with issue the instructor certification, if/when they satisfactory complete Q-school for RIC. They must take a written test and make 80 or better, plus the skills. So, what's stopping us?

- 3) EMS certification used for certification requirement; then revoked by NC OEMS
- 4) Developing/offering a bridge course; to update certification levels from one standard to the next
- 5) Interest in developing a Support Firefighter Course for volunteer FDs; Matt is researching South Carolina
- 6) Clear up (for at least the third time) CLEAR path for HMT and HM Ops MSC certification/qualification

Please see and review the attachments. A week or so back, several of you asked about qualifying instructors in the areas of the MSC; mainly regarding those who are certified as HMT and/or qualified as HMT instructor. So, let me see if I can simplify what we need to do moving forward:

- HM Technician Instructors: As approved by the Certification Board in June of 2019, and the Commission on October 08, 2019 – "All current HM Technician Instructors will be certified and qualified to teach all HM Ops Mission Specific Topics. To be qualified, Technician Instructors must complete the on-line upgrades between April 01, 2020 to June 30, 2020." So, we need to notify all who this applies to when we post the HM re-quals –
 - a. A similar opportunity was approved by the CB back in 2017 "Any Instructor who is qualified to teach Haz-mat Technician meets all requirements toteach all the mission specific areas. These Instructors can simply request the applicable qualification areas be added to their transcript by contact Commission Staff." But the latest CB direction now overrides this 2017 process.
- 2. HM Technicians (who are Instructors): As approved by the Certification Board in September of 2017 and the Commission on October 10, 2017 <u>"Any Instructor who is certified as a Haz-mat Technician, can qualify to teach Haz-Mat Ops, and all mission specific disciplines, by attending Q-school and passing the job-knowledge exam with a score of 80% or higher on the Haz-mat Ops exam. No practical exams are required for those meeting this requirement."</u>
- 3. Non-HM Technicians and non-HM Technician Instructors: All have the traditional format for becoming a qualified instructor, in any of the areas such HM Awareness, HM Ops, and the HM Ops MCS
- 4. Unless you all see any gaps, I see no need to seek clarification by the Board.

Live Fire Instructor and Live Fire Instructor in Charge

NFPA 1041 – Standard for Fire and Emergency Services Instructor Professional Qualifications – 2019 Edition

Phase I –

This is an introductory phase for someone who may be interested in obtaining the Live Fire Instructor in Charge certification/qualification. The basic understanding of the NFPA 1403 (Standard on Live Fire Training Evolutions), NFPA 1402 (Standard on Facilities for Fire Training and Associated Props), any other related standards/regulations which impact live fire training will be the focus in order to help the student prepare for Phase II.

- Meet the prerequisites to be a certified/qualified Live Fire Instructor in Charge which consists of being Fire Fighter qualified instructor for five years
- Instructor II certified
- Take the Office of State Fire Marshal Live Fire Awareness Course (on-line)

Phase II –

Phase II will consist of the candidate who has completed Phase I and attending a 16-hour course. The standards and regulations listed below will be the focus of the course in order to develop an in depth understanding of live fire training as it relates to the various requirements.

Must attend 100% of the Live Fire Instructor Indoctrination Course and pass the written examination with a minimum score of 80% which covers:

- NFPA 1403 Current Edition
- NFPA 1402 Current Edition
- NFPA 1142 Current Edition
- NFPA 1584 Current Edition
- NC Fire and Commission Policy
- State Air Quality and Asbestos requirements

Phase III –

Phase III will consist of the candidate participating in live fire burns under the supervision of a Live Fire Instructor in Charge. Acting as an *apprentice*, the <u>candidate</u> will gain the necessary understanding of the information from Phase II and implementing during actual burns. This includes all the various functions needed to burn in accordance with various standards and regulations as well as the positions identified in NFPA 1403.

Live Fire Instructor and Live Fire Instructor in Charge

NFPA 1041 – Standard for Fire and Emergency Services Instructor Professional Qualifications – 2019 Edition

Within 2 years, of completing Phase II, the candidate must participate in the live fire training evolutions listed below:

- Acquired Structure (Chapter 05; NFPA 1403-2018); and
- Gas-Fired Live Fire Training Structures (Chapter 06; NFPA 1403-2018) or Non-Gas- Fired Live Fire Training Structures (Chapter 07; NFPA 1403-2018); and
- *Exterior Live Fire Training Props (Chapter 08; NFPA 1403-2018)

For each of the above listed live fire training evolutions, the candidate must successfully complete the following:

- Pre-burn plan (in accordance with 4.14 of NFPA 1403) for each evolution; and
- Task log for each position of a Live Fire Instructor (Chapter 7 of NFPA 1041-2019) attested to by the supervising Live Fire Instructor in Charge

*Any prop shall produce live fire as defined by NFPA 1402. NFPA 1402 - 3.3.22 Live Fire. Any open flame capable of emitting thermal load or toxic by-products of combustion that would necessitate the use of personal protective equipment (PPE).

Phase IV –

This phase of the process is crucial in determining if the candidate has learned the myriad of technical aspects as it relates to conducing successful live fire training evolutions and able to apply them in real world situations. This will serve as the practical testing and evaluation segment of the newly realigned qualification program.

- Register for and attend Live Fire Instructor in Charge Qualification Course (skills testing)
 - Must present all pre burn plans from Phase III.
 - o Must score a minimum of 100% on all practical skills
 - Must complete applicable Pre-burn plan(s) of the evolution being tested in Phase IV

Phase V -

Certification / Qualification issued for NFPA 1041-2019; Live Fire in Charge Instructor (Chapter 7 and Chapter 8).
