Preliminary Matters

Vice Chairman Bill Thunberg presided over the meeting and welcomed guests.

Item 1.A.: Roll Call/Conflict of Interest Reminder

Vice Chairman Thunberg asked each member of the Board to introduce themselves for the roll call. Mark Smith replaced Mark Hicks representing Licensed General Contractors. Vice Chairman Thunberg asked each member of the Board to state whether they had actual or potential conflicts of interest that needed to be made known for any items on the agenda. Chris Noles requested to recuse himself from the Miller investigation identified on the agenda. A motion was made by Chris Raynor to accept Noles' request and seconded by Stephen Terry. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously.

The State Ethics Commission has cited the potential for a conflict of interest for members of the Board who are serving in the following appointments.

- Code officials, because they serve on the Board that certifies them.
- Elected officials, because local government entities employ code officials.
- Licensed contractors, because their companies regularly work with code officials.
- UNC School of Government, because the school provides educational services for code officials who are subject to the jurisdiction of the Board.

Board members should exercise appropriate caution in the performance of their public duties should issues involving their certifications or that of any of their employees come before the Board. This would include recusing themselves to the extent that their interests would influence or could reasonably appear to influence their actions.

Item 2: Approval of the January 26, 2016 Minutes

Chris Nuckolls made a motion to approve the minutes of the January 26, 2016 Board meeting. Ray Rice seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously.

Item 2: Approval of the March 15, 2016 Minutes

Chris Noles requested to recuse himself from the special meeting minute approval. A motion was made by Brenda Lyerly to accept Noles' request and seconded by Ray Rice. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously. Chris Raynor made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 15, 2016 Board meeting. Stephen Terry seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously.

Item 3: Approval of New Standard Certificate Holders

Allen Kelly made a motion that the Board award Standard Inspection Certificates to those applicants presented to the Board who have met the education, experience, and examination requirements. Stephen Terry seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and approved unanimously. The list of applicants is Attachment A to the minutes.

Item 4: Recognition of Fifth Level III Standard Inspection Certificate

Vice Chairman Thunberg reported there was one code official receiving his fifth Level III certificate and invited him to meet and receive congratulations from the Board members;

Item 5: Committee Reports:

Executive Committee:

Vice Chairman Thunberg stated the committee had not met and had no report.

Policies and Procedures Committee:

Ken Stafford stated the committee met on March 15, 2016 with Richard Ducker, Mark Hicks, Richard Morris, Hayden Lutterloh, Kathy Williams and Roni Jo Abdella from Safebuilt to discuss the board's approach to out of state applicant experience. The primary purpose was to discuss comity and reciprocity, relative to statutory authority. The March 15, 2016 Committee Meeting notes were provided to the board and are included in Attachment C of these minutes. ICC testing and certifications were analyzed along with other national certification entities and their tie in with national testing companies such as Pearson-VUE and Prometrics. North Carolina COQB statutory provisions do not provide for reciprocity. Where COQB certifies on a basis of levels of the size of the building, some states and ICC certify on residential or commercial and do not require either field experience prior to certification nor requirements for continuing education to maintain licensure. COQB does issue probationary certificates which are valid for two years. The committee concluded that staff analyzing each application on a case by case basis is sufficient to determine comity. The Committee directed Staff to have a conversation with ICC relative to direction they think licensure of building inspector trends for the future especially in the states of Florida and California. Noles posed the question of staff producing a prequalification matrix sheet available to the public, potentially reducing calls to staff. Stafford stated one online matrix used in the state of Virginia was addressed although it is \fairly complex. Thunberg stated a matrix could be misinterpreted as a conclusive determination as opposed to an advisory document subject to approval by both CEO's and jurisdictions. Staff findings will be reported to the Qualification and Evaluation and Policies and Procedures committees who will bring the information back to the board.

Education and Research Committee:

Vice Chairman Thunberg stated the committee had not met and had no report.

Qualification and Evaluation Committee:

Vice Chairman Thunberg stated the committee had not met and has no report.

Item 6: Unfinished Business:

Vice Chairman Thunberg stated there was no unfinished business.

Item 7: Staff Reports

Director

Mike Hejduk stated there was a 14% increase in the number of active CEO's in the past six months despite the relatively higher number of retirements. Hejduk stated that 30% of all applications submitted to the department are incomplete, forcing staff to place them on hold until all information have been submitted. An initiative by staff and NCDOI computer Applications Development Team (ADT) is to create a "smart" interface for the user during the application process for the purpose of providing Board rule-related responses. Hejduk stated the intent is to provide the applicant with real-time feedback indicating possible pre-qualification levels based upon the information the applicant provides. This interface will provide more information to the applicant on the front end by referencing rules that can be coded within the online application, though equivalency of education and experience will have to be individually evaluated. A disclaimer may be needed stating that an evaluation will still

be required to be performed and the Qualifications board will still have to officially issue each certificate. This should improve management of call volume, incomplete applications and applicant questions about trade level eligibility. Brummitt questioned when pre-qualification from the interface would be validated by qualification staff manually. It was discussed how most jurisdictions desire multi-trade inspectors and that the two year probationary period might not be sufficient to produce Building and Electrical inspectors. A motion was made by Chris Noles and seconded by Richard Ducker for a memo to summarize the previous board meeting discussion concerning the review of comity on a case by case basis.

Certification

Terri Tart stated there were 142 standard certificates approved at this meeting and that there are now 172 CEOs holding active Level 3 certificates in all 5 trades. Tart reported there were a total of 16 pre-qualifications awaiting issue after employment with a jurisdiction and 87 expired probationary certificates this quarter. Attention was drawn to the 82% increase in probationary applications from January 2015 through January 2016 and the overall 44% increase in all applications received in that same time period. Tart stated that she and Kathy Williams traveled to Dare County, at the invitation of a retired Chief Building Official and former Chairman of the NC Home Inspector Licensure Board, to observe both building and home inspections to gain a better understanding of the scope of the inspector's daily responsibilities and workload.

Examination

Kathy Williams reported exam scores for all trades and levels. Williams stated that a large number of tests are being administered due to hiring and promotions by jurisdictions and that without the current online, internet based application and review process, board staff would not be able to keep up. Williams noted that there was a large increase in electrical applications to test before the move to the 2014 NEC effective April 1 and only 50 exams have been administered to date on the 2014 NEC. Building, Electrical and Fire Level 1 still have a high percentage of failure but the grades of the exams were relatively high. Plumbing and Mechanical trades continue to have a high passing rate. 246 exams were administered and 150 received a passing score for an overall passing rate of 61%. Williams reported the numbers of exams and the breakdown by trade and the amount of reviewed exams. Williams analyzed the number of exams administered, their cost and the total amount of revenue generated for PSI Services LLC to date since July 1, 2014 as \$167,000. Williams explained the exam question review and challenge process and reported she received a number of complaints in reference to contacting PSI to schedule an exam or review. Williams stated she discussed these issues in a teleconference with four members of PSI Services LLC to try to remedy the issue. PSI Services LLC stated twenty (20) more schedulers were added and a suggestion was made to call at low call volume times after 2:00 PM Pacific Standard Time (PST). PSI Services LLC reported the average wait time has been cut in half and Williams has not received additional complaints concerning scheduling since the teleconference. Williams reported an incident at the Raleigh location with a 20 minute check-in procedure where the newly allowed accumulative amendments were questioned by the PSI Services LLC staff who received confirmation of validity after a phone call and the examinee was allowed to test. Williams also noted that there are still questions in regards to tabs.

Education

Jessica Yelverton reported on the status and number of continuing education (CE) and standard courses approved, scheduled, etc. for the quarter and year to date. All Inspector Association workshops submitted continuing education courses for approval. The standard course instructor workshop for February resulted in two additional standard instructors with the next workshop scheduled for May. Yelverton noted that while there are 30 instructors approved to teach electrical standard courses, only five or six typically schedule and teach. Yelverton reported her visits with the Electrical Institute, NC Fire Prevention School, Rowan-Cabarrus Community College and the Public Relations and Publicity Committee of the Ellis Cannady chapter of IAEI. Yelverton has updated all levels of the Standard Electrical course to the 2014 NEC which is available online. All levels of the electrical instructor manuals and worksheets have been updated and are available online. Yelverton created a new informational section detailing the standard course, examination and certification processes. This section was placed into all standard courses and all standard instructors were notified of the changes to the presentations.

Yelverton discussed her initiative to create "instructor boxes" for standard course instructors with electrical components donated by industry partners to provide "hands-on" training for students.

Investigations

Sam Whittington noted there is currently an incomplete investigation, case #454 involving Morehead City. Whittington addressed complaint #444 involving Jeff Miller and the Town of Boone where Miller signed a final inspection without verifying that all items on the permit he had signed and issued were inspected leading to a finding of basis in fact. Whittington stated a Voluntary Settlement Agreement (VSA) has been agreed to and signed by inspector Miller wherein his Mechanical Level 3 certification is reduced to a Level 2 for a minimum of six (6) months and a requirement to attend and pass Law and Administration course within one (1) year. In order to have his Level 3 reinstated, Miller will have to also attend and pass a standard Mechanical Level 2 course due to the structure in question being a Level 2 hotel. Neither course will count towards his continuing education requirements. The complaint relates to inspections of a gas pool heater and deaths attributed to carbon monoxide poisoning at the hotel. Board members discussed the various actions the board could take in response to the VSA presented as: 1) Accept or reject the proposed VSA, 2) Propose modifications to the VSA, or 3) Schedule a hearing in the matter. Dan Brummitt asked if the VSA was consistent with other agreements. A motion was made by Ken Stafford to accept the voluntary settlement agreement as presented and was seconded by Richard Ducker. The board voted unanimously to accept the VSA as proposed.

Item 8: New Business from Board Members

- A. Chris Noles stated the National Electrical Code remains on a three year cycle while all other codes remain on a six (6) year cycle.
- B. Chris Noles stated that OSFM will be relocated to the Albemarle building in downtown Raleigh in February 2017.
- C. Chris Noles stated that the NC General Assembly Program Evaluation Division (PED) study for licensure is still in discussion while the legislature is in session but it should not have an effect on the Qualification Board.
- D. Chris Noles stated that currently CE courses do not expire and questioned if a rule or policy created for the termination of courses not based on the currently enforced code. Bobby Croom stated that it should be a rule and not a policy and to follow the process of General Statute 150B. There are other outstanding rule changes that are needed. Mike Hejduk stated that all rules in Section .08 have to be reviewed by the Rules Review Commission by a November 2017 deadline. Noles suggested that the Executive Committee should meet and take under advisement the possibility of any additional rules that are necessary should be discussed.

Public Comments

There were no public comments presented to the board.

Adjournment

There being no further business, Chris Raynor made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Allen Kelly seconded the motion. The motion was approved unanimously.

DIRECTOR

Mission Statement: Protect lives and property through code compliance.

NCDOI, OSFM, Engineering and Codes Division staff administer the Board's North Carolina Code Officials Qualification program. As authorized by N.C. General Statutes the program provides a consistent, uniform state level framework for certification of code enforcement officials employed by more than 500 local authorities having jurisdiction (AHJs). From a strategic planning and performance management system perspective the above mission is pursued by focusing on specific program results called "outcomes." One desired outcome is to have a sufficient supply (quantity) of code officials needed to assure code compliance. Another desired outcome is to have competent (quality) code officials enforcing the code. At times challenges are presented when emphasis on one outcome such as quantity may be at the expense of another such as quality.

The current resurgence in the economy is driving demand for qualified code officials nationwide. Jurisdictions that cut back on permitting and inspections staff during the recession are now scrambling to hire personnel in order to address an increased workload in a timely manner. To complicate matters, the number of code officials nearing retirement age is significant. Consequently the number of applications being processed by board staff are at record levels reminiscent of the housing boom of 2007. Development activity is so high in some jurisdictions, there are reports of "poaching" inspectors between jurisdictions. Who knew we were an endangered species? Several jurisdictions recently petitioned the Board to reconsider the way the existing statute and rules on comity [a one-way version of reciprocity] are applied to code officials with ICC certifications in other states. At the January Board meeting this issue was referred to the Policies and Procedures Committee for further discussion.

But how does one go about assessing the degree of competence or quality of officials? We might argue that the score attained on the state exam provides an objective measure of competence. But state exams are only designed to establish the *minimum* level of competence necessary for *newly* certified officials. And, inspectors certified by comity are exempt from the North Carolina State exam. We might also note that the compulsory board-developed standard pre-service education courses conclude with a mandatory exam and that increasing levels of competence are demonstrated by Level I, II and III certifications needed to inspect various occupancies, areas, heights and complexity of buildings and service systems.

In practice, assuring the competence of code officials results from successful execution of the following six *processes* established in the Board rules typical of many certification agencies:

Application, Evaluation, Examination, Certification, Education and Investigation

If a flowchart were drawn, each *process* would have an *input* and an *output*. For example, once a completed application is submitted online, it becomes an input for the staff evaluation process. The output of the evaluation process is either approval (meaning a determination of eligibility to register for the state exam), a request for additional supporting documentation or denial. The process is *effective* when qualified applicants are approved for the appropriate type and level certificate and unqualified applicants are denied. The process is *efficient* when applications are <u>not</u> placed on hold awaiting supporting documentation and are processed quickly to allow examination and issuance of a certificate at the next regular quarterly board meeting.

Recent legislation passed by the General Assembly clarifies misconduct related to inconsistent enforcement. An obvious implication is the broadening of the potential basis for complaints against code officials. Complaints are inputs to the investigation process. Board disciplinary actions may be viewed as outputs of the investigation process and may be considered a potential negative indicator of competence

APPLICATION, EVALUATION, CERTIFICATION

Probationary Certificates

Probationary certificates are available to code enforcement officials (CEOs) who are newly employed or those who need to achieve a higher level of certification. The purpose of the probationary certificate is to allow code enforcement officials the ability to perform code enforcement while receiving on-the-job training, taking required standard courses and passing the state examination. Probationary certificates are valid for a period of two years and not renewable.

Notices of expiration are sent to each inspector and his or her City or County Manager. 87 probationary certificates expired this quarter and are listed below with their corresponding jurisdiction.

Exam Complaint/Comment Summary

Staff received several complaints concerning exams conducted this quarter. The types of complaints and comments are listed below:

Scheduling issues:

Staff received multiple complaints regarding the amount of time on the phone trying to schedule an exam or exam review. Due to the large volume of complaints regarding these issues, staff contacted PSI and scheduled a meeting to discuss these concern.

Staff met with four members of PSI who are directly involved in exam registration and administration by phone. PSI personnel involved: Shaun Snell, Regional Site Supervisor (Responsible for proctors on the east coast); Jason Weller, Network Manager (Responsible for regional site supervisors and physical issues at centers); Tony Shaw, Candidate Center Manager (Responsible for call centers, sites and regional supervisors); and Don Dudley, Director of Client Services: Licensure. NCDOI staff involved: Kathy Williams and Mike Hejduk. During this meeting staff and PSI discussed long wait times on the phone and the inability to schedule exam reviews. PSI stated they had hired 20 additional call staff members which should help alleviate phone wait time. They were able provide information regarding current call wait times which have decreased from 5:16 minutes to 2:37 minutes. They also stated the volume of calls greatly declines after 2:00 pm PST, so getting this information out may help code officials when contacting PSI.

Secondly, PSI stated they had found an IT software issue that had prevented schedulers from make appointments for exam reviews. This issue has been resolved and is no longer a problem.

Testing center issue:

Staff received one complaint regarding the check-in procedure at the Raleigh PSI Center. On April 11, 2016, a new set of exams were released which included the use of the Cumulative Amendment Package. The examinee had this information in his code books at the appropriate places and the proctor wasn't aware of the changes. She was not going to let him use this information. He was able to produce the memo from staff regarding the use of this material. We were able to view this check-in due to video provided by PSI. This individual will receive a comped exam if he has to retake the exam.

Comments:

• Staff has received a few comments and questions regarding the use of tabs and registration issues. Candidates are informed of the approved types of tabs and directed to the Candidate Information Bulletin which contains information regarding tabs and registration procedures.

PSI has offered the opportunity for the staff to attend an exam proctor training in June in Raleigh.

Exam Update

On April 1, 2016, a new form of all 15 exams was released. At this time, there have been no significant issues with the new release, but it is still early in the process. As part of this new release, the exams have been restructured so that all questions are grouped according to reference. However, the questions are not in code order within the grouping. The grouping is intended to improve the space at the test kiosk so that only one book is need at one time.

As a reminder, the current exam structure consists of five technical disciplines for building, electrical, mechanical, plumbing, and fire. There are three distinct levels within each discipline. Currently there is only one form for each exam. A second format of all exams will be available by June 1, 2016.

Meeting Notes

Meeting Date: March 15, 2016 (10:00 a.m.)

This committee meeting was called primarily to discuss items related to licensure of code officials who currently hold national certification or licensure in other states, and who wish to relocate to North Carolina and become licensed in this state. Specific items discussed:

- 1. Comity and Reciprocity.
- <u>2.</u> <u>Statutory Provisions</u> North Carolina Statutes allow for licensure by comity for individuals licensed in other states, but make no provision for reciprocal licensure.
- 3. Methodology for Licensure by Comity for North Carolina. Applications for licensure by comity are considered on an individual, case-by-case basis. There are no blanket comity provisions for licensure in this state.
- 4. Methodology for Licensure in adjoining states (VA, SC, TN, GA). Licensing methods in adjoining states vary widely. Virginia has over 30 categories/levels of licensure, and recognizes ICC and/or NCPCCI certification as acceptable for meeting testing requirements. South Carolina recognizes ICC certification. Georgia does not have statewide inspection requirements, but leaves responsibility up to local jurisdictions. Georgia recognizes ICC, but also permits licensure of inspectors in certain areas to be permitted without further testing for individuals licensed in allied construction trades (for example, a licensed electrician may be employed to inspect electrical work, or a licensed plumber may inspect plumbing work).
- 5. Testing and Certification by ICC. The International Code Council has coursework and certification in over 30 categories. Certification is differentiated between residential and commercial inspectors. ICC has a separate legal module. ICC also has courses and certification for property maintenance and housing, zoning, energy, green buildings, and multiple categories of special inspectors. ICC also makes distinctions between inspectors, plans reviewers and code officials. ICC has developed state-specific exams for the states of California and Florida, and is in the process of implementing reciprocal arrangements between ICC and those states.
- 6. Other Certification Entities. ICC is not the only entity that provides certification of inspectors. Most prominent among other providers is the National Certification Program for Construction Code Inspectors (NCPCCI), which has specific tie-ins with the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials and the International Association of Electrical Inspectors, and eight primarily northern and Midwestern states, including Virginia. NCPCCI provides coursework and certification in all trades, with separate certification for commercial and residential inspectors and plans reviewers.

- <u>7. Tie-in Between ICC and NCPCCI and the National Computerized Testing Companies.</u> ICC has a relationship with Pearson Vue. NCPCCI is contracted with Prometic.
- <u>8.</u> Costs. Costs for coursework and testing through the national certification entities, and North Carolina vary, but are comparable.

As noted previously, for inspectors licensed in other states and wishing to become licensed in North Carolina, licensure by comity is available on a limited and case-by-case basis. There are no provisions in the statutes permitting licensure by reciprocity or comity for individuals holding national certification but no state licensure. After much discussion, reasons were identified for continuing this approach:

- A. Statutory provisions do not allow for reciprocity.
- B. North Carolina has multi-level testing and licensure, with levels (I, II, III) based on project type and size. Most other states (and ICC) either make no such distinction, and when they do make distinctions, have separate licensure for Residential and Commercial Inspectors, and, in some cases, separate licensure for inspectors, plans reviewers and code officials.
- C. Many other states (and ICC) has less stringent or no requirements for field practice and experience before issuance of Standard Licenses or Certifications, or for continuing education for maintaining a license or certification.
- D. North Carolina's Administrative Code includes many components that are unique to our State. ICC does have coursework covering legal and administrative areas, but this course must be broad-based and generic, to cover all states.
- E. North Carolina's provision for 2-year Probationary Certificates allows time and methodology for inspectors licensed in other states to work in North Carolina while satisfying any deficiencies identified by Staff that are preventing immediate issuance of a Standard Certificate.

It was recommended that the full board ask staff to initiate some conversation with ICC relative to the direction they see licensure going in the future, especially given their efforts to establish reciprocal arrangements between themselves and the States of Florida and California.
